








The accused is a 16 year old male. He has experienced a chaotic and dysfunctional childhood and was exposed to alcohol, abuse and neglect. He was raised for the most part by his grandparents. The accused has been diagnosed with partial fetal alcohol syndrome. He uses substances, including alcohol and marijuana.

Circumstances:

The accused was at a party and was in breach of his recognizance conditions of curfew and alcohol. The victim was passed out on a couch at the party and awoke to find her underwear pulled down. She was later told what had happened by someone who had witnessed the assault. According to the witness, he was on his way to get a drink when he heard noises from the living room. He went into the living room and saw the accused having sex with the victim, who was "out like a rock." The witness grabbed the accused by the back of his shirt, pulled him off her and told him to leave the residence. After the accused left, the witness noticed a condom on the floor. He said the victim did not wake up at any time. Other charges came about because he breached his curfew and he consumed alcohol. Ten months later, the accused committed a break and enter, during which he stole some inexpensive jewellery. When he was arrested he was extremely uncooperative. Over the next 5 months, the accused was charged with various breaches of conditions and a break and enter. He pled quilty to the charges.

The young offender is a 15-year-old male who became a foster child at the age of two because of parental neglect, substance abuse and violence. He feels very close to his foster mother. He is attending Grade 9 classes and his behaviour is exemplary. However, at Dale's House, he has angry outbursts and has difficulty taking directions but is unwilling to take an anger management course. His mother said he was difficult to parent. There has been drug and alcohol use in the past. He may suffer from **fetal alcohol syndrome** and is assessed at a high risk to re-offend. Other sexual offending behaviours have come to light.

Circumstances:

The victims of the offences are the granddaughters of the accused's foster mother. They were between three and eleven years of age when the offences occurred which would happen when they visited their grandmother. The accused attempted to and/or was successful in touching their genital areas, performing oral sex on them and vaginal intercourse. The victims would be involved in a game or the accused would take measures to ensure that he was alone with them and not interrupted by adults. The threatening offence occurred at Dale's House. The accused became angry after a verbal altercation and threatened to stab a staff person. He spent 7 days on remand and pleaded guilty.



The Court agreed that the concern is the need for treatment which will best serve both the young offender's and society's interests. 
